1. Accounting policies

Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the provisions of Section 1A (Small Entities) of Financial Reporting Standard 102 ("FRS 102").

Income

Income includes funds generated from the provision of services and from the receipt of grants and donations.

Income from the provision of services is recognised when the service is provided and is stated net of discounts but gross of formal bursaries.

Grants relating to revenue expenses are recognised as income in the same period as the corresponding expenditure. Any revenue grant income which has not been expensed at the end of the financial year is treated as deferred income in the balance sheet.

Donations, where no restrictions are attached, are recognised in the accounting period in which they are received.

Tax

The Company's liability for tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. A current tax asset is recognised in respect of a tax loss that can be carried back to recover tax paid in a previous period.

2. Commitment to the community

In accordance with the principle activities of the Company, fee rates were kept artificially low. Standard rate (before bursaries were applied) for 90 minutes weekly tuition was £25 per term for students below Grade 3, and approximately £105 per term for students Grade 3 and above. In addition the Company awarded bursaries totalling £192 and sibling discounts totalling £210. Three SWeet! students were fully funded by a personal scholarship through the London Music Fund, which had been secured on their behalf by the Company, (although one left the project after one term). One student received £150 from a private sponsor, through the Sponsor A SWeet! Child Scheme organised and administered by the Company.

3. Profit on ordinary activities before taxation

The company has no employees. No Director received any remuneration in respect of their duties as a Director or for the general administration of the Company in either accounting period.

During the year Annette Rhodes received £1,250 in relation to her services as a music tutor. The approximate market value of her services (based on approximately 10 hours p/w for 35 weeks, market rate £35 p/h) was £12,250. She received no payment for her services as a music tutor in the year to 31 August 2019.

In the year to 31 August 2019 two Directors were paid fees in respect of exceptional work commissioned by the Company, which was funded by the grant from Comic Relief via the London Community Foundation, awarded in July 2019 specifically for the purpose. Annette Rhodes received £3,125 in respect of fundraising work and developing the website and Lauren Kate Howard received £675 for fundraising work.

The principal activity of the Company was the provision of music tuition, at fees reduced far below the market rate, to children aged between 8 years and 18 years, who live or attend school in the London Borough of Lambeth. In response to the Covid-19 pandemic, in March 2020 the Company successfully transferred its activities online, and the project continued online for the remainder of the academic year (year end 31st August 2020). Despite this, in 2019 to 2020 the Company maintained its close association with Streatham Wells Primary School in SW2. Working in partnership with this and other local schools, SWeet! actively encouraged applications from students known to face challenging circumstances, and offered financial, practical and emotional support to them and to their families, wherever this facilitated continuity of access to instrumental tuition.

The Company's activities benefitted the community both prior to and during the Covid-19 pandemic. Benefits included very cheap instrumental tuition at a time when this was particularly difficult to access, opportunities to perform and to enter for exams and competitions, and, pre-Covid, a live cultural event. Wider social benefits of the Company's activities, particularly in relation to students' mental health and connection with peers during lockdown, are noted anecdotally by stakeholders. Informal consultation with children also took place weekly in class, whether in person or online.

The Company responded promptly to families' requests and suggestions as the situation regarding Covid-19 evolved. Using anonymous questionnaires, in July 2020 the Company asked students and parents/carers for their views on the service they had received; the Company will use the opinions expressed to shape its service during 2020-2021.

Annual Directors' Report – 1st September 2019 – 31st August 2020

General Overview: During the academic year 2019 to 2020, SWeet! Recorder Consort CIC (hereafter referred to as "SWeet!"), continued to achieve considerable, measurable and sustainable success in meeting its core aims, as specified in the Company's Articles of Association. This was the case despite the emergence of a global respiratory pandemic and its inevitable impact upon a community woodwind ensemble. The principal activity of SWeet! is the provision of music tuition, at fees reduced far below the market rate, to children aged 8 to 18 vears, who live or attend school in the London Borough of Lambeth. Thus, during the pandemic, two components of our usual activity - bringing together children from across the Borough, and having them blow out copiously in front of each other - were actually dangerous to the very community we seek to serve. In response, in March 2020 SWeet! successfully transferred its activities online, and the project continued online for the remainder of the academic year (year end 31st August 2020). However, in 2019 to 2020 SWeet! maintained its close association with Streatham Wells Primary School in SW2. Working in partnership with this and other local schools, SWeet! actively encouraged applications from students known to face challenging circumstances, and offered financial, practical and emotional support to them and to their families, wherever this facilitated continuity of access to instrumental tuition.

Benefits To The Community:

- A total of 31 students were taught, from a variety of backgrounds, including from SWeet!'s target groups, (tables 1 & 6);
- Prior to Covid-19 restrictions, the community came together to enjoy our students' performances at three well-attended events. During the pandemic, the community was able to access online content in place of live performance (table 2);
- Students continue to achieve an exceptional standard of instrumental playing, well beyond the level expected for their age, (tables 3 & 4);
- In October 2019, students attended a Medieval & Early Dance workshop, (table 5);
- Early in the pandemic our Founding Director appeared on a Trinity College London webinar to advise on online music tuition; this benefitted the wider community, (table 5);
- Until March 2020, one student tutor (Grade 8 qualified student aged 13-17) was employed in teaching younger students for 2 hrs/wk, while receiving supervision and training.

<u>Value To Stakeholders:</u> In July 2020, students and parents were asked to give their opinions of SWeet!'s services in anonymous questionnaires. The results made it clear that during this tumultuous year, stakeholders had appreciated our service more than ever:

- "SWeet! provided some excellent engagement for my child during lockdown. It enabled her to feel connected to her close group of students...it provided meaning, which was a huge boost to her mental health "

- "Cultural opportunities, chances to perform in various settings, teamwork, competitions and lots of fun!"

<u>Covid-19 Response</u>: SWeet!'s response in the aftermath of the first UK lockdown in March 2020 was described by one stakeholder as timely, but well-considered. SWeet!'s Founding Director carried out extensive research into the security and efficacy of various video conferencing platforms, and personally telephoned the family of every student to discuss continued access for their child online. SWeet! produced detailed literature to assist stakeholders to navigate the unfamiliar technology, and delivered a 20 minute tech set-up session with each family to ensure continuity of service. Where necessary, SWeet! loaned equipment to students for the purpose of making videos for examination & competition entry.

<u>Demographic</u>: SWeet! is particularly pleased to note that in 2019-2020, children of Polish heritage have accessed our service for the first time. We would like to welcome more Asian students, who are currently under-represented in SWeet!, relative to our local demographic.

<u>Main Funder</u>: SWeet! was successful in bidding for Trinity College London's new Music & Drama Access Award. This paid examination fees, and 9 weeks of tutor fees, for 10 students, of whom 7 also received funding to have an accompanist for their examination. Owing to Covid-19 restrictions, most of these examinations were adapted to digital format, where students recorded themselves playing to individual customised backing tracks made by SWeet!'s resident accompanist. Trinity paid a small commission to SWeet! for administering examinations taken through our digital Centre, and also gifted a one-off unrestricted donation of just over £300. The collaboration with Trinity, our most generous donor in 2019-2020, has resulted in positive publicity for both parties. It is hoped this relationship will continue in future years.

<u>Stakeholder Consultation</u>: In September 2019, SWeet! was planning to implement stakeholder suggestions arising from consultation the previous July. The children had requested to go busking, so SWeet! accepted an invitation to perform at Clapham's Venn Street 2019 Christmas Market - one of only three live performances in 2019-2020. There were also plans to perform at a local home for elderly people, but this became inappropriate in the extreme from March 2020.

Individuals in leadership at Streatham Wells were consulted verbally throughout 2019-2020, and especially during the Covid-19 pandemic. Informal consultation with children also took place weekly in class, whether in person or online. SWeet! responded promptly to families' requests and suggestions as the situation regarding Covid-19 evolved.

In July 2020, SWeet! conducted the usual annual stakeholder survey via anonymous questionnaires. Although in August 2020 it is difficult to plan ahead too far, SWeet! intends to use the responses to shape our service for 2020-2021. We believe tuition will remain online for a considerable time, and plan to engage students in creating digital products, such as split screen videos for publication on YouTube, and recording their group compositions written in lockdown.
